- Wednesday, August 3:
  - Black bear crossing Main Park Drive near Indian Mounds
- Saturday, August 6:
  - Ripening wild fruits include: Chokecherry, red raspberry, blackberry, bunchberry.
- Tuesday, August 9:
  - Mother bear and two cubs crossed Main Park Drive.
  - Spots on White-tailed deer fawn's are beginning to fade.
  - Orioles and Yellow-bellied sapsuckers are seen feeding on hummingbird feeders.
- Wednesday, August 10:
  - Groups of Canada geese are seen feeding in hay/grain fields around the park.
  - Light rain and thunder. 75°F, north-west wind at 3 mph, dewpoint 70°F, humidity 84% at 4 p.m. Heavy rain forecast for the night.
  - Small painted turtle crossing road by campgrounds. Turtles are reported to move to higher ground when there is a threat of significant amounts of rain.
- Additional fruits that are ripening (non-edible):
  - Red baneberry, white baneberry, spikenard, blue-bead lily.
